



Turlin Moor North Consultation 2017

This report outlines the findings from the Turlin Moor North Consultation that took place from 16th May to 23rd June 2017.

Number of Responses

- A total of 120 responses were received to the consultation.

Demographics

- 70% of respondents were female (n=82)
- 50% of respondents were aged 25-54 (n=59)
- 26% of respondents said they were limited by a long-term illness or disability (n=29)
- 95% of respondents were from a White British background (n=106)
- 68% live in Turlin Moor (n=81 respondents)
- The postcode with the highest number of responses was BH16 5BH

Summary Findings

- Respondents gave more negative comments on the Draft Development Brief than positive, including expressing several concerns over the housing development.
- The most popular improvements for developing the community were 'Medical facilities', 'Upgrading children's play areas' and 'A second access in/out of Turlin Moor'.
- The main reasons for choosing these improvements were they 'Need better healthcare provision', they 'Need more activities for children', and that they would lead to a 'Better quality of life for the Community'.
- The other comments put forward by respondents focused on their concerns, development suggestions, and opposing the housing development.

1 Background

During the early stages of the Local Plan Review in 2016, officers engaged with residents on the playing field/open space at that time and a common theme emerged from this engagement - that any development should also deliver essential community facilities. These could include strategic improvements to the local centre, community centre, schooling, affordable housing and would include the re-provision of playing fields and lost open space to satisfy planning policy.

Since the Local Plan Review, and prior to the Turlin Moor Consultation that this report addresses, Ward Members have been kept informed as part of local engagement in order to shape the Turlin Moor consultation process. A Community Engagement Group has been formed comprising Ward Members, Officers of the Borough of Poole, Poole Housing Partnership (PHP) and local residents.

2 Consultation Aims

The aims of the consultation were to find out the following:

- Residents' views on the Draft Development Brief (DDB)
- Residents' priorities for community development
- To understand why these priorities were important to them
- To understand what impact the housing development and community development options could have on their lives
- To understand how negative impacts could be mitigated
- The profile of respondents including demographics and equalities questions to highlight any inequalities that the Council should be aware of when considering the results of the consultation

3 Target Groups

The consultation targeted the following stakeholder groups:

- Turlin Moor residents
- Poole residents
- Local businesses
- Local organisations
- Any other interested stakeholders

4 Methodology

The consultation ensured that the target groups could access the DDB and take part in a variety of ways. These were as follows:

- 1100 information leaflets were distributed to all households in the local area of Turlin Moor. The leaflets contained information about the consultation, when it was taking place and details of how residents could take part in the Drop-in event (see section 8 below). A further 900 leaflets were distributed to other locations including the Drop-in event and those detailed below.
- Paper versions of the questionnaire and copies of the DDB were made available in a variety of locations in Turlin Moor including the Café, Children's Centre, Derek Orchard House, Nurseries, Schools, the Sports Pavilion, St Gabriel's Church, the Youth Centre and Willow View. Copies were also available at Hamworthy Library, and the Civic Centre Reception. A copy of the questionnaire can be found in [Appendix 1](#) below.
- A dedicated webpage for the consultation was created on the Borough of Poole website. This page contained background information on the consultation, details of how to take part and a list of 'Frequently Asked Questions'. The site address was www.poole.gov.uk/turlinmoornorth and was also included on the leaflets mentioned above. The webpage also included an online version of the survey to make it as accessible to the public as possible.

The webpage was viewed 466 times during the consultation period. Please note that this figure does not include page visits that were made from within the Council's computer network.

5 Data Capture and Analysis

The surveys were designed in Snap (survey design software). The paper forms returned were scanned by the Corporate Research Team. These were kept in a locked cupboard and will remain securely held until they are destroyed confidentially until 6 months after the final outcome of the consultation is announced.

Online responses were downloaded into an Excel file and imported into SPSS (statistical analysis software) for analysis purposes. The data was checked and verified in preparation for analysis. The data is held in the Corporate Research Team's secure area.

Quantitative analysis was carried out using SPSS to identify the frequencies for each question. Demographic analysis was carried out to identify any differences in views by characteristics such as age, gender and disability to feed into the Equalities Impact Assessment.

The write in (qualitative) responses were exported into Excel and coded according to categories. Qualitative research does not seek to quantify data, instead, its purpose is to

provide deeper insights into reasoning and impact and many researchers therefore believe that numbers should not be included in reporting. The numbers of people mentioning the most prevalent codes are provided in this report to give an indication of the magnitude of response. Importantly, however, given the nature of the data, this does not provide an indication of significance or salience in relation to the question asked.

9 responses to question 2 were excluded as these respondents provided more than 3 choices and therefore we could not determine which of the selections their top 3 were. Please refer to [Appendix 1](#) to see the question.

6 Consultation Timescales

The consultation ran from 16th May to 23rd June 2017.

7 Communications

A range of communication methods were used to promote the consultation to maximise public awareness and opportunities for participation. A summary of these methods and a description of the level of impact they had can be found in Table 1 below:

8 Drop-in Event

A drop-in event was held at St Gabriel's Church Hall on 17th May between 11am and 8pm so that consultees could talk to Officers about the DDB. This gave them the opportunity to discuss potential impacts of the housing development and any ideas for community development.

Key aspects of the DDB, a list of 'Frequently Asked Questions', and a larger version of the questionnaire were put on display boards along with a map of Turlin Moor North that

attendees could use to mark where they lived. This helped to identify who had been engaged with on the day. This map can be found in [Appendix 2](#) and the yellow dots signify where we people said they lived.

9 Other Responses

In addition to the paper and online responses to the consultation, one letter was also received that commented specifically on the DDB.

Although, the letter welcomed the added clarity that the DDB provided on Site A12: Turlin Moor Recreation Ground, compared to the Local Plan consultation in 2016, the letter raised concerns over two issues: contamination and open space/SANG⁴ provision. The contents of this letter will be considered by Officers along with the other consultation responses.

10 Findings

This section summarises the results of the Turlin Moor North Consultation.

For each question, the base is reported to show the number of people responding to that question. Please note that where numbers have been provided for the most prevalent codes to open-ended questions, this is to give an indication of the magnitude of response rather than an indication of significance or salience in relation to the question asked.

Respondent Profile

This section summarises the demographic characteristics of respondents.

- **Gender:** More females (n=82) responded than males (n=31).
- **Age:** 50% (n=59) of respondents were aged 25-54, while 27% (n=32) were aged 65 and over.

- **Disability:** 26% (n=29) of respondents said they were limited by a disability. 18% (n=20) of respondents said they were 'limited a little' and 8% of respondents (n=9) said they were 'limited a lot'.
- **Ethnicity:** 95% (n=106) of respondents said they were from a 'White British' background.
- **Postcode:** 112 respondents gave their postcode. Of these respondents, 81 said they lived in Turlin Moor and 31 said they lived outside of Turlin Moor. The postcode with the highest number of responses was BH16 5BH (n=13). You can see a full breakdown of the postcodes with their corresponding wards in [Appendix 7](#) below.

Q1 – Do you have any comments on the Draft Development Brief for Turlin Moor North?

94 respondents wrote a comment on the Draft Development Brief. These comments have been analysed broadly by those comments that 'Related to the DDB' (87 comments) and those that 'Did not relate to the DDB' (7 comments). Within these broad codes, sub-codes have been used to refine the analysis further some of which are explained below. A full list of all codes can be found in [Appendix 4](#).

Related to the DDB (87 comments)

87 respondents directly commented on the DDB. The three most prevalent themes that emerged from these comments were:

- **Negative comments about the Housing Development (32 comments)**

These respondents said they did not want the housing development to take place for a variety of reasons. The two most prevalent reasons were that it would make Turlin Moor overcrowded and that it would have a negative effect on the Community because it would take away open space that is used by large sections of the community.

- **Concerns about the Housing Development (25 comments)**

The main concern respondents had over the plans for the housing development was overcrowding. They felt that local infrastructure would not be able to cope with the new influx of residents, specifically referring to the GP surgery (which they felt was already oversubscribed), schools and shops. Some expressed concern over a divide being created amongst a "close-knit community" with the arrival of new residents. Other key concerns included increased traffic congestion at Blandford Road and negative impacts on local wildlife.

- **Positive comments about the Housing Development (12 comments)**

These respondents felt building more houses would be good for the area as these homes are needed and would bring new people into the community. They felt the DDB was thorough and well thought out.

Additional themes that emerged from the comments included: 'Suggestions for community development' (6 comments), 'Suggestions for housing development' (6 comments), 'Concerns about Community Development' (4 comments), 'Project Timings' (1 comment) and 'Other' (1 comment).

Not Related to the DDB (7 comments)

7 respondents answered this question without making a reference to the contents of the DDB. Their comments fell into two main categories:

- **Concerns about Community Development (3 comments)**

These respondents expressed similar concerns to those mentioned above about how infrastructure would handle more residents. They were particularly concerned about healthcare, schooling and traffic congestion. One respondent was concerned about where children and teenagers would go to keep them busy. This is a concern that was also expressed in the following questions.

- **Suggestions about Community Development (2 comments)**

One respondent suggested building a community centre that could provide a variety of functions to the community. The other respondent asked that the Council monitor the level of anti-social behaviour that could be targeted at new residents and introduce a no-tolerance policy if this were to occur.

2 additional comments were submitted but were not relevant to the consultation.

Q2 – Thinking about your local area, which 3 improvements do you think are most important?

[Please note that the question text above was used on the paper questionnaires that were distributed in Turlin Moor as outlined on page 2. On the online survey, the text was changed slightly to, "*Thinking about the area of Turlin Moor North...*" to avoid confusion so that respondents didn't think we were asking about their local area if they lived elsewhere. This had no affect on the analysis of the data.]

Respondents were asked to select their top 3 choices for developing the Community in Turlin Moor. The most popular choices were 'Medical facilities' (n=52), followed by 'Upgrading children's play areas' (n=36), and 'A second access in/out of Turlin Moor' (n=33). The other choices respondents made are listed in Table 3 below.

Q2a – Other (please select and write in)

17 respondents provided an additional comment to question 2.

10 of these comments related to 'other improvements' that respondents would like to see in Turlin Moor. These are outlined in table 4 below:

Other comments respondents gave didn't relate directly to improving the Community. They included comments that were 'against the housing development' (4 comments), 'suggestions for the housing development' (1 comment) which asked for the new homes not to overlook sheltered housing, and 1 comment that was not related to the consultation.

Q3 – Please explain below why the top 3 improvements you chose are important to you.

102 respondents provided an explanation for the choices they made in question 2. 3 key themes emerged which were 'Need better healthcare provision' (26 comments), 'Need more activities for children' (21 comments), and 'Better quality of life for the Community' (20 comments). A full list of the codes for this question can be found in [Appendix 5](#).

Please note that the reasons respondents gave applied across a range of improvements, hence why we have analysed by the reason given rather than the improvement category.

Need better healthcare provision (26 comments)

The majority of these respondents said it was a priority to provide better healthcare provision primarily because the existing doctor's surgery was at full capacity and was already struggling to cope with demand. Some people said they had to wait 3-5 weeks for an appointment. Others commented more generally on how this should be included in any plans to improve Turlin Moor.

Need more activities for children (21 comments)

These respondents felt that it was vitally important to provide facilities for children in Turlin Moor. Several commented on how the existing play areas were not adequate and worn out. Some respondents felt this resulted in children hanging around the streets with not much to do. Therefore, they felt that children's play areas needed upgrading and a skate park and/or multi-games area would be beneficial for older children and teenagers. There was a feeling that this would give them safer places to socialise and have fun, while preventing anti-social behaviour and improving their overall health and wellbeing.

Better quality of life for the Community (20 comments)

There was a general feeling amongst these respondents that the improvements they selected would benefit everybody in the Community. The benefits they felt their selections would bring included greater health and wellbeing, more people being active, spaces to congregate and gaining new skills. Some felt this was important in order to improve their community before building another one.

Additional reasons that made up the top 5 themes for this question, in terms of magnitude of response, were 'Traffic congestion is a priority' (7 comments) and 'More houses will damage our community' (5 comments).

6 respondents also made comments about the Council in their responses. They referred to 'Council neglect' (4 comments) as they felt Turlin Moor was not important to the Council and that residents' concerns had not been heard in the past. They also felt the Council had

other options to building on Turlin Moor but these were not being considered. However, they did not refer to what they thought these other options were. Some made comments that were categorised as 'Predetermination' (2 comments) because that they felt the Council would do whatever it wanted regardless of what residents said in the consultation. One respondent felt the fact that land that had been given to the public was now being built on, was evidence of this.

Q4 – Do you have any other comments on this project?

66 respondents provided an additional comment on the project. 3 key themes emerged from the analysis which were categorised as 'Concerns' (19 comments), 'Development Suggestions' (16 comments), and 'Against Proposals' (14 comments). A full list of the codes for this question can be found in [Appendix 6](#).

Concerns (19 comments)

Respondents expressed concerns over 2 key areas that have been highlighted before in previous questions: Traffic Congestion and Overcrowding.

They felt traffic congestion would get worse with the housing development, including causing pollution to increase. They felt congestion would be particularly worse on Blandford Road and Keyworth Road.

Respondents also felt that overcrowding was inevitable due to the housing development. In particular, they raised concerns over the quality of housing which they felt would be cramped due to the lack of space. They also expressed concern over whether schools and medical facilities could cope with the extra demand, while some felt crime could increase in the area.

Development Suggestions (16 comments)

Respondents provided a variety of suggestions for the development of Turlin Moor. 'Housing affordability' (3 comments) was the only category that was referred to by more than one respondent. One respondent felt that the money raised from the sale of the land should pay for some of the houses. While another felt that having a greater proportion of affordable housing would be more financially beneficial to the Council through more responsible ownership and better maintenance of the properties. They felt those who have a 'Right-To-Buy' option, should be able to do so at a discounted price. Other suggestions were put forward which can be found in [Appendix 6](#).

Against Proposals (14 comments)

The majority of these respondents simply expressed that they were against the housing development. Some vehemently opposed the development because it was taking away open space for children to play in, negatively impacting wildlife and removing green space. Other reasons provided for their opposition to the plans were the negative impacts they would have on the Community's local identity and crime.

15 respondents made comments about the Council in their responses. They commented mainly on how they felt the Council should invest in youth (5 comments) by providing more money for youth clubs and investing in activities for children. There were some negative comments around how they felt that the Council had ruined Poole through over-development in recent years. One respondent commented on how they felt that Council was “bribing” residents by offering improvements to the Community in exchange for the loss of green space.
